For children and families, not-for-profit means higher quality, more inclusive, and more experienced and better paid educators and teachers.

For the past 15 years Goodstart has been making a difference for children and families across Australia.

Being a not-for-profit means we don't generate profits for shareholders so we're free to reinvest in our centres. At Goodstart, every dollar goes into what matters most: improving outcomes for children. But it is much more than that. We're on a mission to ensure every child has the learning, development and wellbeing outcomes they need for the best possible start to school and life. That's why we exist.

Our not-for-profit model sets us apart. We prioritise investment in our educators and teachers, knowing that high quality teaching drives better outcomes. We invest in staffing and centre environments - lifting quality across the board. We dedicate funding, time and expertise to building an evidence base

that supports advocacy for better policies — especially for children who have the most to gain from early learning, yet are least likely to attend. At the same time, we draw on the latest research to continuously improve our teaching and learning practices.

Put simply, we make decisions based on just one question - what is best for children?

With centres in every state and territory, we've helped transform the lives of hundreds of thousands of children since 2010. As our understanding of children's needs has deepened - especially for those experiencing vulnerability - we've continued to invest where it counts, strengthen support for our centre teams, and call on governments to step up where their help is needed most.


We are all about delivering social impact - helping children and families make positive change.

Our teams deliver high quality early learning and care. We ensure our educators are the best paid in the sector, meaning they feel valued and stay with us. We know low team turnover means safer centres with better child outcomes. We also know that investing back into our people means higher quality early learning for children.

We're working to support children right across Australia. Right now, one quarter of our centres are in low-income areas – and we are working to ensure changes are made to our sector to ensure all children can access affordable, high quality early learning no matter where they live or their family circumstances.

Around one third of our centres are located in rural and regional areas and we are deeply committed to practical reconciliation.

1,665

children supported by Inclusion Development Funding

We go above and beyond to ensure every child gets the best start. Last year, 1,665 children were supported through Inclusion Development Funding, 6,300 children received Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS) support, and 62 Goodstart centres provided allied health services to 164 children under the National Disability Insurance Schedule.

We support children with additional needs or disabilities when other providers turn children away. Last year we spent nearly \$7m to support children with additional needs and a further \$3.5m to support access and affordability.



Our team advocates to governments not just for the children who attend our centres – but all children across Australia – drawing on our centres expertise, research and data.

support children who would otherwise miss out
on early learning. So far we've ensured more
